

# Canadian History since World War I Evaluation Profile & Outline

**Course Description/Rationale/Overview:** This course explores some of the pivotal events and experiences that have influenced the development of Canada's identity as a nation from World War I to the present. By examining how the country has responded to economic and social changes and how individuals and groups have contributed to Canadian culture and society during this period, students will develop their ability to analyze historical and current events.

**Class Requirements:**

**Materials/textbooks/equipment**

**Text: A single class text will not be used on this course. In-class sets of texts and other assignments will be used frequently.**

**Recommended: A ring binder allowing easy addition of handouts.**

**Missed Tests and Late Assignments**

Students are to be present for test dates. There must be a verified, valid reason when a test is missed. The teacher may provide an alternative opportunity for testing or record an "absent" for that test.

All summative assignments will have a clear *Due Date*. Assignments that are handed after the *Due Date* will be accepted and assessed by the teacher if submitted prior to the *Deadline*. The *Deadline* is defined as the class period in which that graded assignment is returned to the class, unless there are extenuating circumstances.

For the mid-term report, no mark will be recorded for a missed summative assignment.

Where a student has not submitted enough work for the teacher to determine the student's level of achievement the report card will indicate that the student's work is incomplete and no grade will be assigned.

At the semester end, where summative assessments are incomplete, a mark of zero may be assigned and used to calculate the student's final grade.

**Assessment Strategies**

Frequent small quizzes.

Occasional larger tests.

Daily observations of classroom work habits and effective note-taking habits.

Frequent short in-class assignments and worksheets/questions.

Culminating activity.

- Culminating activity – Canadian history timeline.

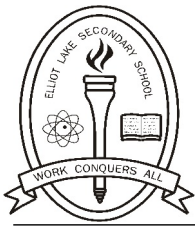
